

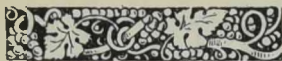

SECTION III.

LITURGICAL USE OF THE CALENDAR.

I. THE FESTIVALS.

The Festivals of the Church are not all celebrated with the same degree of solemnity ; the words *Double*, *Semi-Double* and *Simple*, found in the Calendar, show the degree of solemnity with which each feast is celebrated. The order is as follows : *double of the first class*, *double of the second class*, *double major*, *double*, *semi-double* and *simple*. When the office is *double*, an entire Anthem is said or sung before and after each Psalm ; when *semi-double*, only a word or two are said or sung before the Psalm. A *simple* has only three lessons at Matins. A *feria* is a week-day for which no Saint's Office is appointed.

The principal Festivals are *doubles of the first class*. Some Festivals have an Octave, or succession of eight days, on which, with certain exceptions, the Office and Mass of the Feast are said, or a commemoration made.

II. THE ROMAN MISSAL.

The prayers and portions of the Holy Scripture, of which the Mass is composed, are partly always the same and partly different every day. Those that are invariable are contained in what is called the *Ordinary* of the Mass, at the beginning of the Missal. The parts that are changeable, or *proper*—*viz.*, the *Introits*, *Collects*, *Graduals* and *Tracts*, *Gospels*, *Offertories*, *Secrets*, *Communions* and *Post-Communions*—form the subsequent contents. As the *Prefaces* are not so frequently subject to change, they follow each other in regular succession in the *Ordinary* of the Mass.

If a double of the 1st or 2nd class, or a Feast of the Lord, falls on a Sunday, the Mass of the Feast is said instead of that of the Sunday, unless it be a Sunday of the *first class*—*viz.*, the First Sunday of Advent, the Sundays of Lent, Passion, Palm, Easter, Low, Pentecost and Trinity Sundays—which are never superseded. The Sundays of the *second class*, which are superseded only by doubles of the *first class*, are the 2nd, 3rd and 4th of Advent; Septuagesima, Sexagesima and Quinquagesima Sundays. The Gospels for Sundays thus superseded are said at the end of the Mass, instead of St John's Gospel; and a Commemoration of Sunday, by its proper *Collect*, *Secret* and *Post-Communion*, is made after the Collect, etc., of the Festival. The Calendar, in the first part of this Directory, indicates the various Prayers said at Mass on each day of the year.

III. THE VESPER BOOK.

The Evening Service of the Church is contained in the Vesper Book. The following is the order of Vespers: *Pater noster* and *Ave Maria* being said, the Priest intones the Versicle *Deus, in adjutorium meum intende*, to which the choir answer by the Response, *Domine, ad adjuvandum me festina*, with the *Gloria Patri*; and when five Psalms, with their Anthems, have been sung, the Priest chants the *Little Chapter*. Then are sung the Hymn, with its Versicle and Response, and *Magnificat* with its Anthem, followed by the Prayers and Commemorations appointed for the day; which, if it be neither a double nor within an Octave, are followed by the Commemoration or *Suffrage* of the Saints (or during Paschal time, the Commemoration of the Cross), to be found after the Common Vespers for Sunday. All these Commemorations on Sunday are indicated in the Calendar.

PART II.

THE HIERARCHY AND THE CLERGY.

SECTION I.

THE GENERAL HIERARCHY OF THE CHURCH.

THE Catholic Hierarchy, or the governing body of the Holy Catholic Church, consists of: 1. His Holiness the Sovereign Pontiff, assisted by the Sacred College of Cardinals, and by the Sacred Congregations (of which the Cardinals are the chief members), the Tribunals and the Offices of the Roman Curia; 2. The Patriarchs, Archbishops and Bishops; 3. The Apostolic Delegates, Vicars and Prefects; and 4. certain Abbots and Prelates.

I. GENERAL SUMMARY.

His Holiness The Pope,

The greater, or more ancient Patriarchates, are those of: Alexandria, *Latin* and *Coptic*; Antioch, with four Patriarchal Sees, *Latin*, *Greco-Melchite*, *Maronite* and *Syriac*; Constantinople, *Latin*; and Jerusalem, *Latin*. The less are those of: Babylon, *Chaldaic*; Cilicia, *Armenian*; the East Indies, *Latin*; Lisbon, *Latin*; Venice, *Latin*; and the West Indies, *Latin*.

The above summaries are for the most part taken from the official *Annuario Pontificio*, published at Rome in 1926.

Besides the *Residential Sees*, there are many *Titular Sees*, formerly (until 3rd March 1882) called *Sees in partibus infidelium*, that is, Sees in infidel regions, the Archbishops and Bishops of which only take their title from them without being bound to residence. These Sees are, for the most part, assigned to Archbishops and Bishops appointed, either to Apostolic Delegations, Vicariates or Prefectures; or to the office of Coadjutor, Auxiliary or Administrator of a Diocese.—Many are vacant.

II. THE SOVEREIGN PONTIFF.

HIS HOLINESS POPE PIUS XI (ACHILLE RATTI), the 260th Roman Pontiff, was born at Desio, March 31, 1857; ordained Priest, December 20, 1879; consecrated Titular Archbishop of *Lepanto*, October 28, 1919, transferred to Titular See of *Adana*, April 19, 1921, transferred to Metropolitan See of Milan and created Cardinal, June 13, 1921; elected Pope, February 6, and crowned February 12, 1922.

III. THE SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

The Cardinals, as the advisers and assistants of the Sovereign Pontiff, are the Supreme council or senate of the Church. On the death of the Pontiff, they elect his successor.

There are three orders of Cardinals, *Bishops*, *Priests* and *Deacons*. These orders are distinct from those of the Hierarchy: with very few exceptions, the Cardinal Priests are archbishops or bishops; and the Cardinal Deacons are generally priests.

The Sacred College, when complete, consists of 70 members; 6 Cardinal Bishops, whose dioceses are the six "Suburban Sees," near Rome; 50 Cardinal Priests, who take their title from the "Titular Churches," to which they are appointed, with jurisdiction and right to a throne, etc., therein; and 14 Cardinal Deacons, who are appointed to other churches called "Deaconries."

The first Cardinal Bishop is *Dean*, the first of the Priests is *First Priest*, and the first of the Deacons is *First Deacon*, of the Sacred College. The Dean has the right of consecrating, and the First Deacon the right of proclaiming and crowning, a new Pope.

On the death of the Pontiff the Cardinal *Camerlengo* has the administration of the public affairs of the Holy See.

The "creation" of a Cardinal sometimes precedes, even by several years, its "publication" or proclamation. The Cardinal is then said to be "reserved *in petto*," and, when proclaimed, he takes precedence according to date of creation.

IV. THE ROMAN CURIA.

The Roman Curia, as re-constituted by the Apostolic Constitution *Sapienti consilio* (29th June 1908) of Pope Pius X., consists of the following Sacred Congregations, Tribunals and Offices:—

SACRED CONGREGATIONS,

And the Matters with which they have to deal.

1. *Congregation of the Holy Office.*—The protection of faith and morals; the judging of heresy; the doctrine and the use of Indulgences; impediments to Marriage with non-Catholics; dogmatic teaching as to Marriage and other Sacraments; the examination, and the prohibition, of books dangerous to faith, or otherwise pernicious.

2. *Consistorial Congregation.*—The preparation of matter for Consistories; the erection and division of dioceses, etc., and the election of Bishops. Also whatever relates to the government of dioceses not subject to the *Propaganda*; to the reports of Bishops concerning the state of their dioceses; to apostolic visitations; and to the spiritual care of emigrants.

3. *Congregation of Sacramental Discipline.*—Legislation as to the administration and reception of the Sacraments; dispensations from impediments to Marriage and to Ordination, and in regard to the Blessed Eucharist; questions as to the validity of Marriages and of Ordinations.

4. *Congregation of the Council.*—The observance of precepts of the Church and dispensations therein. Regulations as to parish priests and canons; to pious associations, pious bequests and pious works; to benefices, ecclesiastical property, etc. Also whatever relates to the celebration of Councils and their ratification, and to meetings and conferences of Bishops.

5. *Congregation for the Affairs of Religious.*—The Regulation of matters between Bishops and Religious, and amongst Religious themselves, including persons who, without vows, live a community life, or are secular members of Third Orders. Also the granting of dispensations to Religious.

6. *Congregation "de Propaganda Fide."*—Having jurisdiction over missionary countries, including, however, many regions where hierarchies are established. From this jurisdiction the United Kingdom, Holland, Luxemburg, Canada, Newfoundland and the United States, were withdrawn in 1908.

7. *Congregation for the Eastern Church.*—Having jurisdiction over all persons and things pertaining to the Oriental Rites, except in matters that belong to the Holy Office.

8. *Congregation of Sacred Rites.*—The care and regulation of rites and ceremonies; the beatification and canonisation of Saints; and whatever relates to sacred relics.

9. *Congregation of the Ceremonial.*—The regulation of papal

ceremonies ; of sacred functions performed by Cardinals ; and of the precedence of Cardinals, and of envoys to the Holy See.

10. *Congregation for Extraordinary Ecclesiastical Affairs.*—The consideration of matters submitted to its examination by the Supreme Pontiff through the Cardinal Secretary of State ; especially those connected with civil laws, or relating to agreements made with civil powers.

11. *Congregation of Seminaries and of Universities of Studies.*—The regulation of university and other studies ; the granting of power to confer degrees, etc.

HIERARCHY RESTORED BY POPE PIUS IX., 29TH SEPT. 1850.

By Apostolic Letters of Pope Pius X., 28th Oct. 1911, England and Wales, which from 1850 had only one Province, were divided into three Provinces. Catholic Population of the Empire.

The Catholic population of the British Empire is estimated as follows :—

SECTION III.

THE HIERARCHY OF SCOTLAND.

I. VICARS-APOSTOLIC.

From the Extinction of the Hierarchy in 1603 till its Restoration in 1878.

1. The ancient Hierarchy ended with JAMES BETOUN, Abp. of Glasgow, who died at Paris on the 25th April 1603, aged 79. After being subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and first Vicar-Apostolic of England till 1623, and afterwards to local Prefects of the Mission, the Clergy were incorporated into a missionary body by decree of *Propaganda*, 1653, and governed by the following *Prefects-Apostolic*—WILLIAM BANNATYNE (or *Bellenden*), 1653–61; ALEXANDER DUNBAR (or *Winster*), 1662–68, 1672–94; and JOHN WALKER (or *Ross*), 1668–71. In May 1694 a Scottish *Vicariate-Apostolic* was established. This was divided into two *Districts*, the *Lowland* and the *Highland*, in February 1731; and these into three, the *Eastern*, *Western* and *Northern*, by Papal Rescript of 13th February 1827. This last arrangement remained in force till the re-establishment of the Hierarchy by the Apostolic Letter *Ex supremo Apostolatus apice*, 4th March 1878.

3. *Celebrations for Benefactors and Deceased Clergymen.*

The Sacred Congregation of the Council by a Rescript dated the 17th July 1924 had decreed (1) that the former obligation of Masses for deceased priests and five annual Masses for Benefactors ceases on the 31st December 1924, and (2) that from the 1st January 1925 all priests affiliated to a Diocese in Scotland must celebrate one Mass each year for benefactors and all deceased priests.

A voluntary Association is being formed among the secular clergy of the country to perpetuate the ancient custom: a copy of the Constitution of the Association and Form of Promise may be had from the Diocesan Registrar.

Comprising Counties of Argyll and Inverness (south of a line drawn from the northern extremity of Loch Luing to the junction of the Counties of Inverness, Aberdeen and Banff); the Islands of Bute and Arran and the Hebrides.

THE See of Argyll was founded about 1200, being disjoined from the Diocese of Dunkeld; and was vacant for more than three centuries. JAMES HAMILTON was appointed to the See on 14th July 1553, but was probably never consecrated.

The See of the Isles (*Insularum* or *Sodorensis*) is said to have been founded about 447 by ST PATRICK, who consecrated GERMANUS, its first Bishop; was united to *Man* till

the end of the 14th century ; and was vacant for 325 years, from the death of RODERICK MACLEAN in 1553.

PART V.

ECCLESIASTICAL AND GENERAL INFORMATION.

SECTION I.

ECCLESIASTICAL LAWS AND OBSERVANCES.

1. EASTER DUTIES AND INDULGENCE.

THE Faithful of the Dioceses of St Andrews and Edinburgh, Glasgow and Dunkeld, are authorised to satisfy the obligation of the Paschal Communion, and to gain the Plenary Indulgence, on any day from the first Sunday of Lent to Sunday within the Octave of the Ascension, inclusively ; and those of the Diocese of Galloway, of Aberdeen, and of Argyll and the Isles, from the first Sunday of Lent till Low Sunday. This permission is granted for a term of five years (S.C.C. ; 21st Nov. 1921).

2. FAST AND ABSTINENCE DAYS.

The new Code of Canon Law makes many important changes in the general law of fasting and abstinence. The Indult, however, granted in perpetuity to Scotland by the Holy See on 27th January 1911, still continues in force. The regulations of both Code and Indult as they apply to Scotland are here summarised.

I. FAST DAYS OF ONE MEAL.

1. The Ember-days throughout the year.
2. The Vigils or Eves of Pentecost, Assumption, All Saints and Christmas.
3. In Lent all days except Sunday, up to noon of Holy Saturday.

N. B.—(a) If a fasting Vigil falls on a Sunday, the fast is not observed either on the Sunday or on the preceding Saturday ;

(b) Except in Lent, a Holiday of Obligation is never a fasting day ;

(c) The old law, forbidding the use of fish and flesh at the same meal, is abolished ;

- (d) At the morning and evening refectations, the quantity and quality of the food taken are to be regulated by the approved custom of the country ;
- (e) The law of fasting is binding on all between the completion of their 21st and the beginning of their 60th years.

II. DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

On which the Church forbids the use of Flesh Meat or Soup made from Meat.

1. All Fridays throughout the year ;
2. The Ember Wednesdays throughout the year ;
3. The Vigils or Eves of Assumption, All Saints and Christmas, but not when they fall on a Saturday or Sunday ;
4. In Lent, Ash Wednesday, Ember Saturday and (up to noon only) Holy Saturday.

N.B.—(a) Except in Lent, a Holiday of Obligation is never a day of abstinence ;

- (b) Eggs, butter and such like, as well as dripping, lard, and any condiments formed from animal fat, may be taken on any day of the year ;
- (c) The law of abstinence is binding on all who have completed their 7th year.

3. MARRIAGES.

Marriage may be contracted on any day of the year. The *Solemnising* of Marriage, *i.e.* the Solemn Blessing of the Church, which is given only during Mass, is forbidden from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday, and from the first Sunday of Advent to Christmas Day, all dates being inclusive. Bishops, however, may for a just reason allow the Solemnising of Marriage any day during the forbidden periods, provided the laws of the Liturgy be observed. A widow, who has already received this Blessing, may not again be blessed at any subsequent marriage.

Marriage is constituted by the free consent of two parties taking one another for husband and wife. Anything interfering with the freedom of consent, in the way of serious error, grave fear and violence, may endanger the validity of the marriage bond.

The age required for valid marriage is sixteen years complete in the case of the man, fourteen years complete in that of the woman ; those under twenty-one years of age should before marriage inform their parents and obtain their consent.

Marriage cannot be contracted without a Dispensation by persons within the third degree of kindred or the second degree

of affinity; if attempted the marriage is invalid. Spiritual kindred contracted by Baptism, *i.e.* between a god-parent and a god-child, is also an invalidating impediment.

Marriage between a Catholic and an unbaptised person is invalid without a Dispensation.

A "mixed" marriage (that is, a marriage between a Catholic and one who, though baptised, does not profess the Catholic Faith) is unlawful without a Dispensation; and the Dispensation cannot lawfully be given unless for a sufficiently grave reason, and subject to the following conditions as laid down by the Council of Fort Augustus (Decr., xvii. 5): 1. That *all* the children that may be born of the marriage shall be baptised, and brought up, in the Catholic Faith. 2. That the Catholic party shall have full liberty for the practice of the Catholic religion. 3. That no religious marriage ceremony shall take place elsewhere than before the Catholic Priest. 4. That the Catholic party shall endeavour to effect the conversion of the non-Catholic party to the true faith of Christ. These promises will ordinarily be made in writing by the parties.

For parties preparing for marriage, the golden rule is: *give very early notice to the parish priest*, who will furnish precise and helpful instructions as to both civil and ecclesiastical requirements. Banns have to be proclaimed on three consecutive Sundays or Holidays, and evidence of Baptism has to be furnished by both parties, even in the case of a mixed marriage. If it can be done without serious inconvenience, Catholics should be confirmed before marriage. As a general rule, the parish priest of the bride, in the case of a mixed marriage the parish priest of the Catholic party, will take charge of the marriage.

The Decree *Ne temere*, which became law in Scotland only on the 1st September 1908, made important regulations for the celebration of marriage, either between two Catholics, or between a Catholic and a non-Catholic. These regulations have been incorporated into, and somewhat modified by, the new Code of Canon Law, which came into force on the 19th May 1918. The following points should be noted:—

I. Engagements, even when formally and solemnly contracted, produce no canonical effects and afford no canonical ground for claiming a fulfilment of the promise.

II. Only those marriages are valid which are contracted before the parish priest or the Ordinary of the place, or a priest delegated by either of these, and at least two witnesses.

III. The parish priest and the Ordinary of the place validly assist at a marriage:

(a) only within the limits of their territory: within which they

assist validly at marriages not only of their own subjects, but also of those not subject to them ;

(b) provided that not compelled by violence or by grave fear they ask and receive the consent of the contracting parties.

IV. They assist licitly :

(a) when they have legitimately ascertained the free state of the contracting parties ;

(b) when they have ascertained that one of the contracting parties has a domicile, or at least has lived for a month in the place where the marriage takes place.

V. When the parish priest or Ordinary or delegate as above (No. II.) cannot be got :

(a) in danger of death marriage may be validly and licitly contracted before two witnesses only ;

(b) outside the case of danger of death, when these conditions are prudently considered as likely to last for a month, marriage may be contracted before two witnesses only ;

(c) in either case, if any priest is at hand, he should be called in to assist ; but his presence or absence does not affect the validity of the marriage.

VI. (a) The above laws are binding on all persons baptised in the Catholic Church, and on those who have been converted to it from heresy or schism.

(b) The same laws are binding also on the same Catholics as above, if they contract marriage with non-Catholics, baptised, or unbaptised, even after a Dispensation has been obtained.

(c) Non-Catholics, whether baptised or unbaptised, who contract among themselves, are nowhere bound to observe the Catholic form of marriage ; nor are those who, being born of non-Catholic parents, have been baptised in the Catholic Church, but have been brought up from infancy away from the Catholic faith.

4. SICK CALLS.

*All sick calls should be given in at the Priest's house at a timely hour in the morning. If this reasonable rule were adhered to, it would save the Clergy much unnecessary labour, and the people many disappointments, which they may justly ascribe to their own want of system.

On Saturdays, eves of Holidays, and other days which are generally devoted to the Confessional, the Priest should not, if possible, be called away from this important duty. Unless in cases of necessity, sick calls should not be made on Saturdays or Sundays, when the Clergy have so many other duties to attend to.

It is the duty of the people to conform to whatever regulations may be made by the Clergy, on these and other matters connected with Religion, in their respective congregations. All things should be done in order, according to the advice of St Paul.

When the Priest is called to attend a sick person, everything that he requires for the administration of the Sacraments should be furnished as becomingly as possible in the room where the sick person lies—viz., a table covered with a clean linen cloth, on which should be laid a candle, a vessel of holy water with an Asperges, a small vessel of common water for the purification of the Priest's fingers after the administration of the Holy Viaticum, and a napkin for the sick person at the time of Communion. As the Priest generally brings the Blessed Sacrament on these occasions, everything should be so becomingly prepared, according to their means, as to show the great respect of the inmates for Jesus Christ, and the high value they set upon the honour thus rendered to their house in the visit of their Lord and Redeemer.

While the Priest is administering the Viaticum and Extreme Unction, the assistants should devoutly offer up their prayers to God on behalf of the sick person, to implore that he may receive those Sacraments with the necessary dispositions.

SECTION II.

INDULGENCES AND DEVOTIONS.

1. INDULGENCES GRANTED TO SCOTLAND.

EXPLANATION OF INDULGENCES.

An Indulgence is a remission of the whole, or a part, of the *temporal* punishment that often remains to be suffered for sins which, as to their guilt and *eternal* punishment, have been already remitted. For the effect and validity of an Indulgence, it is not only necessary that there be a competent authority in him who grants it, and a just cause or motive for the grant, but it is also necessary, on the part of him who obtains it, that he renounce and be sincerely sorry for all his sins, that he be in the state of grace, and that he duly perform the conditions prescribed. Of Indulgences, some are called *plenary*, which, when fully obtained, remit the whole of the temporal punishment that remained due on account of past sins; others are for a certain number of years or days, which, when fully obtained, remit as much of the temporal punishment as would have been discharged by the performance of so many years or days of Canonical Penance. Thus, by a *quarantine* Indulgence is meant the remission of so much of the

future penalty (*poena*) of sin as is the equivalent of keeping a Lent according to the strict discipline of the Church.

Indulgences attached to sacred objects, such as rosaries, etc., are available to any person using these objects, and the Indulgences cease only when the thing is destroyed or sold.

The conditions for most Plenary Indulgences include Confession, Communion, Visit to a Church and prayers for the Pope's intentions. For an Indulgence granted for any particular day, Confession made eight days before will suffice; Communion may be made the day before, and both Confession and Communion any day within the Octave. For Triduums, Novenas and such-like, Confession and Communion may be made any day within the Octave after the conclusion of the exercises. For daily communicants, or for those who confess regularly twice a month, no special confession is necessary. The visit may be made to any church or oratory and may be made from noon of the preceding day to midnight of the last day of the time appointed. Prayers for the Pope's intentions should be recited vocally and not merely mentally. Jubilee Indulgences, as well as some others, have their own special conditions.

PLENARY INDULGENCES GRANTED TO SCOTLAND.

1st. From the Feast of St Thomas, Apostle, 21st December, to the first Sunday after the Epiphany, inclusively.

2nd. From Ash-Wednesday to the second Sunday of Lent, inclusively.

3rd. During the time appointed in each Diocese for complying with Easter duties.

4th. From Pentecost Sunday to Sunday after Corpus Christi.

5th. From Sunday before the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul to the Octave day.

6th. From Sunday before the Feast of the Assumption to the Octave day.

7th. From Sunday before the Feast of All Saints to the Octave day.

8th. On the Feast of St Andrew, and during the Octave.

Conditions for gaining these Indulgences.

1st. That within the time prescribed the faithful approach the Sacraments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

2nd. That on the day of their Communion they offer up some prayers to God for the happy state of the whole Church of Christ, for its Supreme Pastor, the Bishop of Rome; for peace and concord between all Christian Princes; for the exaltation and propa-

gation of the Holy Catholic Faith, especially in our own country, and for the eternal salvation of all Christians.

3rd. That, if they have an opportunity, they visit within the limited time some church or oratory, and pray to God as has been mentioned before.

4th. That, if their circumstance enable them, they perform some works of mercy.

PLENARY INDULGENCE GRANTED TO GLASGOW TEACHERS.

A Plenary Indulgence is granted, subject to the usual conditions, to teachers in the Archdiocese of Glasgow who help in the preparation of children for their First Communion, and assist thereat (*S.P. A.*, 12th July 1924).

PARTIAL INDULGENCES: THE LITANY OF THE B. VIRGIN

On the 6th May 1879, His Holiness granted the Apostolic Benediction, and an Indulgence of seven years on each Saturday, and on the Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, to the Faithful of England and Scotland who shall recite or sing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in any church in either country.

2. THE PENTECOST NOVENA.

For the Pentecost Novena, prescribed by Encyclical Letters of 5th May 1895 and 9th May 1897, the following Indulgences have been granted to those taking part in the Novena:—1st. seven years and seven quarantines for each day; 2nd. a Plenary Indulgence on any one day of Novena, or on Pentecost, or on any day of the subsequent Octave, on the usual conditions of Confession and Communion and prayers for the Pope's intention. [These Indulgences are attainable by those also who are legitimately impeded from attending the Public Devotions, provided the Novena be done in private and the other conditions fulfilled.] Moreover, those who again, during the Octave of Pentecost, inclusive of Trinity Sunday, publicly or privately recite every day, according to their devotion, some prayers to the Holy Ghost, and satisfy the other conditions, may gain a second time the above Indulgences, both plenary and partial. All these Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

3. THE OCTAVE OF CORPUS CHRISTI.

For the continuance and daily increase of the abundant fruit produced by the Decree of 20th December 1905, on *Daily Communion*, Our Holy Father, POPE PIUS X., by a letter of the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences of the 10th April 1907, to the Bishops of the Catholic Church, has expressed his wish to have, as far as may be possible, the following annual observances:—

(a) IN CATHEDRAL CHURCHES.

That on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, either immediately after the Festival of CORPUS CHRISTI, or (if the circumstances of persons or places so require) at some other time of the year to be fixed by the Bishop, there shall be in every Cathedral Church three days' prayer, as here described: namely—

I. That, *on each day*, there shall be a sermon on the great excellence of the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and on the dispositions required for worthily receiving it. That, after the sermon, the Blessed Sacrament shall be exposed: and during the Exposition the prayer *O most Sweet Jesus* (see below) shall be recited, to be followed on the Sunday by the *Te Deum*. That the *Tantum ergo* shall then be sung, and the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament be given.

II. That, *on the Sunday*, the last of the three days, there shall be at the usual parochial Mass, a homily by the Parish

5. THE MONTH OF OCTOBER.

For the *October Devotions*, prescribed by Decrees of 20th August 1885, etc., the following Indulgences have been granted:—*1st*, seven years and seven quarantines each time one joins in the public recital of the Rosary and Litany of the B. Virgin (or, being legitimately impeded, says them privately), and prays according to the intentions of the Pope; *2nd*, a Plenary Indulgence to those who, having done this at least ten times, confess and communicate; *3rd*, a Plenary Indulgence to all who, on the Feast of the Rosary or within the Octave, confess, communicate and pray in some church to God and the B. Virgin according to the intention of His Holiness; *4th*, seven years and seven quarantines, each time, for the recital of the following prayer to St Joseph enjoined by the Encyclical of 15th August 1889.

PRAYER TO ST JOSEPH.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, we fly in our tribulation, and while imploring the help of thy most holy spouse, thy protection also with confidence we crave. By that affection which united thee with the Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God, and by the fatherly love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly supplicate thee to look down benignantly on the heritage which Christ Jesus purchased with His Blood, and in thy might and power to succour us in our necessities.

Defend, O most provident Guardian of the Divine Family, the chosen race of Jesus Christ; keep us, most loving father, from all taint of error and corruption; do thou from heaven, as our most powerful Protector, stand graciously by us in this conflict with the powers of darkness; and as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus in the imminent peril of His life, so now defend the Holy Church of God from hostile wiles and all adversity, and through

PRAYER BEFORE THE BLESSED SACRAMENT.

O most sweet Jesus, Who didst come into this world to enrich the souls of all mankind with the life of Thy grace, and Who, to preserve and sustain this life in them, dost daily give Thyself in the most august Sacrament of the Eucharist, as a saving medicine to heal their infirmities and a divine food to support their weakness, we pray and beseech Thee to pour forth upon them most graciously Thy holy spirit, so that, being filled therewith, any who are in mortal sin may, by returning to Thee, be restored to the life of grace which they have lost; and that those who, by Thy great mercy, already serve Thee may daily, as far as each one is able, come devoutly to Thy heavenly banquet, and in the strength thereof may find a remedy for their daily venial faults and a support of the life of Thy grace, and, thus becoming more and more cleansed from sin, may obtain the everlasting happiness of heaven. Amen.

family are : (1) 7 years and 7 quarantines on the day of consecration; (2) a Plenary Indulgence on the usual conditions on the day of consecration; (3) 300 days on the annual renewal of the consecration. The form of consecration, *which alone is valid for the effect of the Indulgences* (S.P.A.: 1st March 1918; A.A.S., X, 154), is the following:—

ACT OF CONSECRATION.

O Sacred Heart of Jesus, who didst manifest to Blessed Margaret Mary the desire of reigning in Christian families, we to-day wish to proclaim Thy most complete regal dominion over our own. We would live in future with Thy life, we would cause to flourish in our midst those virtues to which Thou hast promised peace here below, we would banish far from us the spirit of the world which Thou hast cursed; and Thou shalt reign over our minds in the simplicity of our faith, and over our hearts by the whole-hearted love with which they shall burn for Thee, the flame of which we shall keep alive by the frequent reception of Thy Divine Eucharist.

Deign, O Divine Heart, to preside over our assemblings, to bless our enterprises, both spiritual and temporal, to dispel our cares or sanctify our joys, to alleviate our sufferings. If ever one or other of us should have the misfortune to afflict Thee, remind him, Heart of Jesus, that Thou art good and merciful to the penitent sinner. And when the hour of separation strikes, when death shall come to cast mourning into our midst, we will all, both those who go and those who stay, be submissive to Thy eternal decrees. We will console ourselves with the thought that a day will come when the entire family, reunited in Heaven, can sing for ever Thy glories and Thy mercies.

May the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and the glorious Patriarch

St Joseph, present this consecration to Thee, and keep it in our minds all the days of our life.

All glory to the Heart of Jesus, our King and our Father.

7. PRAYERS AFTER LOW MASS.

To be said kneeling.

Hail Mary, *three times*. Then, *Hail Holy Queen*.

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy; Hail, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To Thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to Thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn then, most gracious Advocate, Thine eyes of mercy towards us; and after this our exile, show unto us the Blessed Fruit of Thy womb, Jesus; O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us pray.

O God, our refuge and our strength, look with favour on Thy people who cry to Thee; and through the intercession of the Glorious and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and St Joseph her Spouse, of Thy Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, mercifully and graciously hear the prayers which we pour forth for the conversion of sinners, and for the freedom and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

St Michael the Archangel defend us in the day of battle; be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil;—"the Lord command him," we humbly pray;—and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and the other wicked spirits who go about the world for the destruction of souls. Amen. (*300 days Indulgence.*)

To the above prayers may be added the following invocation said three times:—

Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us.

(*Indulgence of 7 years and 7 quarantines.*)

8. THE ANGELUS.

In Catholic countries, and in many places at home, the Angelus Bell is rung in the morning, at noon and in the evening at sunset to honour the Mystery of the Incarnation. To gain the indulgences attached to this Devotion, the Angelus must be said *kneeling*, except on Saturday evening, and Sunday, when it is said *standing*. In Paschal Time, that is, from Holy Saturday at noon till the Saturday before Trinity Sunday at noon, inclusively, the

Regina Cœli is said instead of the Angelus. This prayer is always said *standing*. Those who do not know the *Regina Cœli* may gain the indulgences by saying the Angelus; but it must be said *standing* during Paschal Time. For the convenience of the Faithful is appended a translation of the *Regina Cœli* taken from the *Raccolta*.

Queen of Heaven, rejoice. Alleluia.

For He whom thou wast made worthy to bear. Alleluia.

Hath arisen as He said. Alleluia.

Pray for us to God. Alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary. Alleluia.

R. For the Lord hath risen indeed. Alleluia.

Let us pray.

O God, who through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, has vouchsafed to give joy to the whole world, grant us, we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of eternal life. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

9. ASSOCIATION FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH.

The Association assists by prayers and alms the Catholic Missionaries in heathen and non-Catholic countries.

CONDITIONS OF MEMBERSHIP.—(1) The daily recitation of *Our Father* and one *Hail Mary*, with the invocation: *St Francis Xavier, pray for us*; and (2) the annual contribution of not less than 2s. 2d. yearly, or one halfpenny weekly. (3) Special Members contribute one guinea, or more, yearly. (4) Life Membership subscription, £8.

ORGANISATION.—The usual method of collection is by the formation of Groups or Circles of Ten Members, of whom one acts as Collector. The Collector receives the contributions of his group, circulates among them the *Annals of the Associations*, and pays over his collection to the Local Treasurer. A return of the sums received, and of their appropriation is inserted annually in the *Annals of the Propagation of the Faith*. One copy of each issue of the *Annals* is supplied to every ten members.

SPIRITUAL FAVOURS.—An exceptionally large number of spiritual privileges, including Plenary and Partial Indulgences, is granted to Associates. Extensive Faculties are also given to Priests who direct local centres or become special members. A complete list of these privileges may be obtained from the Secretary of the Scottish Branch, 1213 Dumbarton Road, Glasgow, or from any of the Diocesan Officials (*vid.* p. 212).

SECTION III.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION.

I. EXCERPTS FROM PARLIAMENTARY ACTS.

*Voluntary or Denominational Schools.**Education (Scotland) Act 1918.*

Sec. 18 (3). Any school transferred to the education authority shall be held, maintained and managed as a public school by the education authority, who shall be entitled to receive grants therefor as a public school, and shall have in respect thereto the sole power of regulating the curriculum and of appointing teachers :

Provided that—

- (i) the existing staff of teachers shall be taken over by the education authority and shall, from the date of transfer, be placed upon the same scale of salaries as teachers of corresponding qualifications appointed to corresponding positions in other schools of the same authority :
- (ii) all teachers appointed to the staff of any such school by the education authority shall in every case be teachers who satisfy the Department as to qualification, and are approved as regards their religious belief and character by representatives of the church or denominational body in whose interest the school has been conducted :
- (iii) subject to the provisions of section sixty-eight (Conscience Clause) of the Education (Scotland) Act 1872, the time set apart for religious instruction or observance in any such school shall not be less than that so set apart according to the use and wont of the former management of the school, and the education authority shall appoint as supervisor, without remuneration, of religious instruction for each such school, a person approved as regards religious belief and character as aforesaid, and it shall be the duty of the supervisor so appointed to report to the education authority as to the efficiency of the religious instruction given in such school. The supervisor shall have right of entry to the school at all times set apart for religious instruction or observance. The education authority shall give facilities for the holding of religious examinations in every such school.

(4) Any question which may arise as to the due fulfilment or observance of any provision or requirement of the preceding sub-section shall be referred to the Department, whose decision shall be final.

(8) In any case where the Department are satisfied, upon representations made to them by the education authority of any education area, or by any church or denominational body acting on behalf of the parents of children belonging to such church or body, and after such inquiry as the Department deem necessary, that a new school is required for the accommodation of children whose parents are resident within that education area, regard being had to the religious belief of such parents, it shall be lawful for the education authority of that area to provide a new school, to be held, maintained and managed by them subject to the conditions prescribed in sub-section (3) of this section, so far as those conditions are applicable; the time set apart for religious instruction in the new school being not less than that set apart in schools in the same education area which have been transferred under this section.

Reformatory and Industrial Schools.

Education (Scotland) Act 1908.

Sec. 66 (1). The Court of Justice, in determining the certified school to which a youthful offender or child is to be sent, shall endeavour to ascertain the religious persuasion to which the offender or child belongs, and the detention order shall, where practicable, specify the religious persuasion to which the offender or child appears to belong, and a school conducted in accordance with that persuasion shall, where practicable, be selected.

(3) Where an order has been made for sending a youthful offender or child to a certified school, which is not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the offender belongs, the parent, legal guardian, nearest adult relative, or person entitled to the custody of the offender or child may apply—

(a) if the detention order was made by a . . . court acting in and for the place in and for which the court which made the order acted; and

(b) in any other case, to the Secretary of State to remove or send the offender or child to a certified school conducted in accordance with the offender's or child's religious persuasion, and the Court or Secretary of State shall, on proof of the offender's or child's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant:

Provided that—

(i) the application must be made before the offender or

- child has been sent to a certified school, or within thirty days after his arrival at the school, and
- (ii) the applicant must show to the satisfaction of the Court or Secretary of State that the managers of the school named by him are willing to receive the offender or child :
- (iii) nothing in this section shall be construed as preventing any such person as aforesaid from making an application to the Secretary of State after the expiration of the said period of thirty days to exercise the powers of transfer conferred on him by the other provisions of this Act.

There is a Catholic Certified Reformatory School for boys at Westthorn, Parkhead, Glasgow.

There are Catholic Certified Industrial Schools for boys at Bishopriggs, Glasgow ; Slatefield Street, Glasgow ; and Tranent (Mr William Considine, S.S.C., 2 Queen Street, Edinburgh, Secretary and Treasurer) ; for girls at 74 Abercromby Street, Glasgow, at Dalbeth, Glasgow, and Nazareth House, Claremont Street, Aberdeen.

Old Age Pensions.

By the Old Age Pensions Act 1908 (amended December 23, 1919) every person fulfilling the statutory conditions laid down in the Act, is entitled to such pension while the conditions are fulfilled and he remains qualified under the Act. The statutory conditions are : The person must be 70 years of age, satisfy pension authorities that for 10 years before receipt of any sum towards pension he has been a British subject, residing in the United Kingdom, and that his yearly means do not exceed £49, 17s. 6d. By the 1924 Act a deduction not exceeding £39 a year is made from such part of a person's means as is not derived from earnings and the total left, after such deduction is made, is taken as the yearly means for the purpose of fixing the rate of pension according to the following scale :—

Pensions are paid weekly in advance out of money provided by Parliament. Pensions do not deprive the pensioner of any franchise, right, or privilege, or subject him to disability.

Forms of Application may be obtained at the local Post Office.

Entertainments Tax.

The Entertainments Tax is levied on payments for admission of persons as spectators or members of an audience to any

entertainment. Under the law, the Tax is payable by means of Stamped Tickets of admission, unless the Board of Customs and Excise have issued their written Authority for other arrangements. Failure to use Stamped Tickets where they should be used renders the Proprietor of an entertainment and the persons admitted liable to penalties.

Stamped Tickets of Admission may be either Government tickets (that is, tickets supplied by the Customs and Excise Department, which are imprinted or impressed with a stamp denoting the Tax) or Proprietors' own tickets to which are affixed adhesive Excise Stamps denoting the Tax. Tickets must be stamped at the time of sale and Proprietors' own tickets of admission must be clearly printed or marked with the price, and a statement whether such price is inclusive or exclusive of the Tax.

Applications for Certificates of Exemption from Tax may be made in the case of Entertainments of any of the following classes :

(1) An Entertainment, the whole of the takings of which, without any deduction for any expenses whatever, are devoted to philanthropic or charitable purposes.

(2) An Entertainment which is intended only for the amusement of children and the charge for admission to which is not more than 1d. for each person.

(3) An Entertainment provided by or on behalf of a School or other educational Institution, not conducted or established for profit, which is provided solely for the purpose of promoting some object in connection with the School or Institution, and at which all the persons taking part as

performers are under the age of sixteen years and are receiving or have received instruction in the School or Institution.

The Board of Customs and Excise are empowered by law to repay the amount of Tax paid in the case of any Entertainment where they are satisfied that the net proceeds of the Entertainment are devoted to philanthropic or charitable purposes, and that the whole of the expenses of the Entertainment do not exceed 20 per cent. of the receipts.

Applications for Exemption or for Repayment must be made not later than seven clear days before the date of the Entertainment on the prescribed forms, which may be obtained at any Customs and Excise Office.

3. POSTAL REGULATIONS.

INLAND LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

When prepaid, not above 2 ounces, 1½d.; for every additional 2 ounces, ½d. Inland letters must not exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, or 1 foot in depth, unless official letters sent to or from a Government Office.

LETTERS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

To British Colonies and possessions abroad, to Egypt, the United States of America, and the places in Morocco where

there are British Post Office Agencies, the postage is 1½d. for 1 ounce, and 1d. for each additional ounce. To Foreign Countries, with the above exceptions, 2½d. the first ounce, and 1½d. for each additional ounce.

PRINTED PAPER.

When prepaid, not above 2 ounces, ½d.; each additional 2 ounces, ½d. Limit of weight, 2 lbs.

The following articles or documents may be sent at Printed Paper rate:—Books and other publications, commercial or business papers of a formal character, as invoices, orders for goods or work to be done, inquiries for quotations; printed notices and letters (these may have the date, time, and place of meeting or appointment filled in in writing and formulas of courtesy not exceeding five words or initials); printed Christmas, New Year, Easter, birthday, picture, greeting, and visiting cards; manuscripts and printed proofs. "Printed Paper" should be written on the top left-hand corner of the address side of envelope or wrapper.

POST CARDS (INLAND).

The prepaid rate of postage on every post card is 1d., except where it fulfils the conditions mentioned under Printed Paper rate, where the charge will be ½d. To come under the latter rate the words "Printed Paper" must appear on the address side and post card should be crossed out. Post cards must be made of ordinary cardboard, not thicker than the thickest, nor thinner than the thinnest, official post card. They must not exceed 5½ in. by 3½ in., nor be less than 4 in. by 2½ in. The left-hand half of the address side may bear a written or printed communication.

POST CARDS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Post cards for a destination outside the United Kingdom are charged at the rate of 1½d. for a single post card, and 3d. for a reply post card. They must be similar in size and substance to the official post card, and must have the title "POST CARD" printed or written on the address side. Post cards for any British Possession and certain Foreign Countries may bear a written or printed communication on the left-hand half of the address side.

NEWSPAPERS (INLAND).

For every registered newspaper not exceeding 6 oz., 1d., with a further ½d. for every additional 6 oz., or fraction thereof. If two or more newspapers are sent in a single packet, each copy will

be liable to the same postage as if it had been posted separately. The limit of weight is 2 lbs. Every packet must be open at both ends, and must have no enclosure, except its supplement or supplements. To places abroad, the postage is $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every 2 oz.

UNPAID

inland letters, halfpenny packets, and newspapers are charged with double postage, and if *insufficiently stamped*, with double the deficiency.

REGISTRATION.

Prepaid letters, newspapers, and printed papers and commercial papers may be registered for the United Kingdom, and for almost all places abroad, for a fee of 3d.

PARCEL POST (INLAND).

The greatest length allowed is 3 feet 6 inches, the greatest length and girth combined, 6 feet. The greatest weight allowed is 11 lb. The rates are :—

MONEY ORDERS.

For inland money orders the charge is : for sums not exceeding £3, 4d. ; above £3 and not exceeding £10, 6d. ; above £10 and not exceeding £20, 8d. ; above £20 and not exceeding £30, 10d. ; above £30 and not exceeding £40, 1s.

POSTAL ORDERS

are issued for any value, mounting by sixpence, from 6d. to 19s. 6d. inclusive, and for 20s. and 21s. at the following rates of poundage ; 6d. to 2s. 6d. (by increases of 6d.), 1d. ; 3s. to 15s., $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. ; 15s. 6d. to 21s., 2d.

Broken amounts, but not fractions of a penny, may be made up by the use of stamps not exceeding fivepence in value or three in number affixed to the face of any postal order.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

1s. and upwards received at an interest of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. (or 6d. for every pound) per annum.

SECTION IV.

CHRONICLE OF EVENTS.

1. CONSTITUTION OF THE CATHOLIC EDUCATION COUNCIL FOR SCOTLAND.

*Resolutions passed at a Meeting of the Scottish Hierarchy,
12th October 1926.*

1. That, in the interests of efficiency and economy, it is necessary to establish a Catholic Education Council for Scotland, to promote the objects hereinafter described, and especially to take over the supervision of Scottish Training Colleges hitherto exercised by the Catholic Education Council meeting in London.

2. That, while thus severing the connection with the Education Council for England and Wales, to which in future no Scottish representatives will be appointed, it is desirable that friendly relations and co-operation on matters of common interest should be maintained between the two bodies, as also between the Scottish and English Religious Inspectors through the inter-communication of their respective Secretaries, and that, if possible, Scottish Diocesan Inspectors of Religious Instruction should continue to attend the Annual Meeting of Inspectors, their expenses being defrayed by their own Council.

3. That the Scottish Council shall consist of twenty-four Members chosen as follows :—

(a) Four Members from each of the two Archdioceses and three from each of the four Dioceses.

Of these two shall be nominated by each Archbishop and one by each Bishop. The remaining two shall in each case be elected by the Priests in charge of Missions, with the recommendation that at least one from each Diocese shall be a layman or woman.

(b) Two Members to be chosen by the Catholic Teachers'

Federation, one to represent Primary and the other Secondary Schools.

(c) One Member chosen by each of the Training Colleges.

4. That the Council shall elect from among its Members a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, and that these officials shall hold office for three years, and that the Chairman and Secretary shall be *ex officio* members of all Committees.

5. That the Council as first elected shall hold office for three years, and thereafter one-third of the Members shall retire each year, but be subject to re-election. The vacancies thus created, as well as those caused by death, resignation, etc., shall be filled by the person or persons by whom the Member thus falling out was chosen.

6. That a General Meeting of the whole Council shall be held at least once a year to elect Committees, receive Reports, and carry out other business of general importance. A Report of the year's work shall be submitted to the Hierarchy at their Meeting on the second Tuesday in May. That other meetings of the whole Council or of Committees shall be held according to need and circumstances.

7. That the Executive Committee shall include at least one representative of each Diocese.

OBJECTS.

8. That it shall be the duty of the Council :—

(a) To advise the Scottish Hierarchy on all matters regarding Catholic education in Scotland.

(b) To manage, under the direction of the Bishops, all affairs of general interest regarding elementary or secondary schools, and to supervise the management of Hostels and Training Colleges, it being arranged that the Committees in charge of Training Colleges shall be free to co-opt additional Members representative of those Colleges.

(c) To maintain a due supply of trained Teachers for elementary and secondary schools, care being

always taken to observe the principles laid down by the Bishops regarding the Religious training of Teachers, and the qualifications required for admission to Training Colleges.

9. That the executive powers of the Council shall be confined to matters of ordinary administration and shall not extend to wider questions involving changes of policy, except after reference to, and by the express instruction of, the Hierarchy.

10. That, when directed by the Bishops, the Council shall act as representing the Catholic Body in Scotland in dealings with the Scottish Education Department.

FUNDS AND GRANTS.

11. That an annual collection shall be made in all the Missions of Scotland and the proceeds forwarded to the Treasurer of the Council. This collection will take the place of that hitherto made for the General Council in London.

12. That the Council shall use the funds thus placed at its disposal for any or all of the following purposes.—

- (a) For grants to Hostels or Training Colleges.
- (b) For payments of travelling expenses of Religious Inspectors to Hostels and Training Colleges, or to Meetings as referred to in No. 2 (above).
- (c) For payment of such honoraria as may seem fitting to Examiners or outside Lecturers on Religion, Philosophy, etc.
- (d) For cost of necessary printing, *e.g.* examination papers, teachers' certificates of religious knowledge, etc.
- (e) For the establishment of scholarships.
- (f) For the cost of prizes (religious books) to pupils attaining distinction in religious examinations.
- (g) For payments of travelling expenses of Members attending Meetings.

2. THE FRANCISCANS IN EDINBURGH.

The Sept-Centenary of the coming of the Franciscans to Britain occurred on the 10th September 1924, and in the *Catholic Directory* of the following year there was given a short account of the history of the Order in Scotland. Since then another Centenary has taken place, the seven hundredth anniversary of the death of St Francis of Assisi, and while it was being celebrated with marvellous enthusiasm throughout the whole Christian world, the Catholics of Edinburgh gave a practical demonstration of their veneration for the Saint by inviting the Franciscans to return and once more take up their residence in the city. The Grey Friars first came to Edinburgh in the year 1447 at the invitation of James I., the Poet King, the Friary being built and presented to them by the generosity of the people. For 112 years the Friars laboured in the city, leading edifying lives, faithful to the strict observance of their rule, living apart from the world yet taking a large share in pastoral work. Nor did they confine their energies to the city; in all parts of the country they were to be found preaching and instructing the people; in the neighbouring University of St Andrew's they acted as Governors and Lecturers, and as recognised scholars they were consulted in matters of moment by King and Noble. At the Reformation, with their brethren from other Scottish friaries, they were compelled to fly the country and find refuge on the Continent. The Friars have now returned after a lapse of 366 years to the Capital of Scotland. Suitable premises have been placed at their disposal, and on Saturday, 13th November 1926, Catholic Edinburgh gave a cordial welcome to the new Franciscan community of four priests and two lay brothers. The buildings allotted to them stand at the corner of Lothian Street and Bristo Place, within a stone's throw of their former habitation. These consist of a Church and a two-storied house. The Church, a handsome stone structure with pinnacles, was erected in 1834 by Bishop Carruthers, and was used as a Chapel of Ease by the Clergy of St Mary's, Broughton Street, then the only Catholic Church in the city. In 1850 it was made a separate mission, under the patronage of St Patrick, with three resident priests, and so continued till 1856, when the Clergy removed to the present St Patrick's in South Grey's

Close. The Lothian Street Church was then converted into school premises, and the education of the Catholic youth of St Patrick's was carried on there for 46 years until more servicable accommodation was found in Blackfriars Street by the purchase of the United Industrial Schools. Leased afterwards as a medical college and then as a billiard saloon, old St Patrick's has once more reverted its ecclesiastical purpose, and was solemnly reopened and blessed by Bishop Graham in the presence of a large gathering of the clergy and laity. High Mass was sung by the Very Rev. Fr. Provincial, O.F.M. (Father Herbert), with Fr. Oswin, O.F.M. and Fr. Raphael, O.F.M., as Deacon and Sub-Deacon. Very Rev. Canon M'Gettigan, after reading a telegram from Cardinal Garparri conveying the Pope's blessing to all present, speaking on behalf of the bishop and in the name of clergy and laity, extended a welcome to the Friars Minor to the Capital of Scotland.

3. NOTEWORTHY EVENTS.

6th Dec. 1925.—Armadale. Opening and blessing of new Church of the Sacred Heart by the Right Rev. Bishop Graham.

13th Dec. 1925.—Glasgow. Celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the Church of Our Lady and St Margaret, Kinning Park, Glasgow.

14th Jan. 1926.—Glasgow. Opening of new wing of St Aloysius' College, Garnethill.

7th Mar. 1926.—Glasgow. Reopening of the Church of the Sacred Heart, Bridgeton, after extensive improvements and redecoration.

21st Mar. 1926.—Greenock. Formal opening of St Patrick's Church by the Most Rev. Archbishop Mackintosh. A priest was first appointed to this district in 1924, and the first Mass in St Patrick's was celebrated on the 21st June 1925.

26th Mar. 1926.—Greenock. Opening of Parochial Hall, Nelson Street. The building, purchased by

the Rector of St Mary's, has been adapted to the purposes of a parish hall, and constitutes one of the best of its kind in the town.

10th April 1926.—Bishopton. Laying of foundation stone of the new Church of Our Lady of Lourdes by the Most Rev. Archbishop Mackintosh.

11th April 1926.—Scots College, Rome. Opening of new wing by His Eminence Cardinal de Lai, Protector of the College. The new portion comprises a spacious refectory, above which are two floors with rooms for thirty students.

18th April 1926.—Alva. Opening and blessing of the new Church by the Right Rev. Bishop Toner. This Church is the first erected in the country under the title of St John Vianney, the Curé of Ars.

8th April 1926.—Glasgow. Opening of Carstairs House, Lanarkshire, as a Home for Mentally Defective Children. The property comprises, in addition to the mansion house, an area of 700 acres.

13th May 1926.—Lochee. Golden Jubilee of the Church of the Immaculate Conception. Celebration of the event is deferred pending the completion of improvement in the Sanctuary and interior of the Church.

7th June 1926.—Greenock. Dedication of new altars of the Sacred Heart and Our Lady, and of new pulpit in the Church of St Lawrence.

10th June 1926.—Edinburgh. Celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the priesthood of the Right Rev. Mgr. Patrick Provost Morris, Prot.-Ap. *ad instar*, M.R., V.G.

10th June 1926.—Galloway. Celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the priesthood of the Very Rev. Lord Archibald Canon Douglas, Honorary Canon of the Cathedral Chapter of the Diocese of Galloway.

- 24th June 1926.*—Dumbarton. The Right Rev. Mgr. Hugh Canon Kelly, Rector of St Patrick's, is nominated a Domestic Prelate of His Holiness.
- 6th July 1926.*—Dumbarton. Laying of foundation stone of Memorial Tower at St Patrick's to commemorate the Centenary of the Mission.
- 11th July 1926.*—Alexandria. Opening and blessing of the new Church of Our Lady and St Mark at Ferryfield by the Most Rev. Archbishop Mackintosh. The building is designed in a simple form of Italian renaissance architecture and has accommodation for 850 worshippers.
- 10th Aug. 1926.*—Strathhtay. Celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the Church of the Holy Cross. The Right Rev. Bishop Toner presided at the ceremony and was accompanied by a large number of the clergy of the diocese.
- 15th Aug. 1926.*—Lincluden. Celebrations to mark the transference to the Diocese of Galloway by the Duchess of Norfolk of the ruins of Lincluden Abbey. The Right Rev. Bishop McCarthy presided at the ceremony.
- 22nd Aug. 1926.*—Eskadale. Celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the Church of St Mary. The ceremony was presided over by the Right Rev. Bishop Bennett, who was accompanied by the Clergy of the Diocese.
- 24th Aug. 1926.*—Hawick. The mansion house of Stirches, rebuilt twenty-three years ago at a cost of £23,000, was opened as a Mental Home for Ladies. The institution is approved and licensed by the General Board of Control for Scotland and is under the care of the Sisters of St Augustine.
- 8th Oct. 1926.*—Glasgow. Reopening of St Peter's, Partick,

after extensive improvements and redecoration. The interior of the church has been repainted, a new throne reredos erected, stained-glass windows placed in the Sanctuary and a Rood hung over the entrance to the Altar.

8th Nov. 1926.—Newton. Laying of foundation stone of a new Church by the Most Rev. Archbishop Mackintosh.

8th Nov. 1926.—Dundee. Celebrations in honour of the 75th Anniversary of St Mary's Church, Forebank. The interior of the Church has been repainted, the High Altar has been embellished and improvements effected in the Northern Porch.

1926.—Dundee. In the Cathedral the Lady Chapel situated in the Crypt has been renovated and beautifully decorated. Additional accommodation has been provided in the Girls' School by the erection of three new classrooms. New Recreation Halls have been secured for the men by the parish in Temple Lane.

The REV. JOHN CHARLES BATTEL was born at Stonepark, Aclare, Co. Sligo, on the 9th March 1903. He entered St Nathy's College, Ballaghadorcen, on the 11th September 1916, and the College des Irlandais, Paris, on the 24th September 1920. He received the tonsure on the 5th June 1923, minor orders on the 6th June 1923 and 3rd June 1924, the subdiaconate on the 3rd June 1925 and was ordained deacon on the 5th November 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by the Rt. Rev. Edward Mulhern, Bishop of Dromore, in the College Chapel, Paris, on the 30th May 1926.

The REV. THOMAS GANNON was born at Perth on the 4th August 1900. He entered Blairs College on the 7th August 1913, St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in September 1919, and the Scots' College, Rome, in October 1920. He received the tonsure on the 29th April 1923,

minor orders on the 26th May and 28th October 1923, the subdiaconate on the 1st November 1925, and was ordained deacon on the 19th December 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by Cardinal Pompili, in the Basilica of St John Lateran, Rome, on the 27th February 1926.

The REV. PATRICK GILMARTIN was born at Ballintrillick, Co. Sligo, on the 16th October 1899. He entered St Patrick's College, Cavan, on the 27th August 1914 and St Kieran's College, Kilkenny, on the 7th September 1920. He received the tonsure on the 16th and minor orders on the 17th and 18th June 1924, the subdiaconate on the 9th June 1925, and was ordained deacon on the 6th September 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Downey, Coadjutor-Bishop of Ossory in the Cathedral, Kilkenny, on the 30th May 1926.

The REV. JAMES GRAHAM, D.D., was born at Motherwell on the 6th August 1902. He entered Blairs College in August 1917, St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick in September 1919, and the Scots' College, Rome, on the 22nd October 1922. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Thomas Gannon.

The REV. JOSEPH HAMILL was born at Clydebank on the 12th April 1901. He entered Blairs College on the 23rd August 1915, and St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in September 1920. He received the tonsure on the 13th September and minor orders on the 14th September and 8th December 1924, the subdiaconate on the 29th November, and was ordained deacon on the 30th November 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Donald Mackintosh, Archbishop of Glasgow, in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, on the 29th May 1926.

The REV. FRANCIS HAMILTON was born at Rutherglen on the 16th July 1893. He entered Campion House, Osterly, on the 14th September 1919, and St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in September 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Joseph Hamill.

The REV. JOHN HUGHES, D.D., was born in Dundee on the 28th March 1900. He entered Blairs College in 1913,

St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in 1919, and the Scots College, Rome, in 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Thomas Gannon.

The REV. ADRIAN J. KELLY was born in Dublin on the 16th August 1899. He entered Mount Melleray Seminary in 1920, and All Hallows' College in 1922. He received the tonsure on the 13th, minor orders on the 14th and 15th June 1924, the subdiaconate on the 21st June, and was ordained deacon on the 20th September 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Naughton, in All Hallows' College Church, on the 20th June 1926.

The REV. THOMAS A. KELLY was born in Dundee on the 29th April 1901. He entered Blairs College in 1915, the Seminary at Issy, France, in 1921, and the Seminary, Rue de Regard, Paris, in 1925. He received the tonsure on the 26th May 1923, minor orders on the 22nd December 1923 and 15th June 1924, the subdiaconate on the 7th June 1925, and was ordained deacon on the 19th December 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld, in the Cathedral, Dundee, on the 29th May 1926.

The REV. ALEXANDER KERR was born in Dundee on the 3rd January 1902. He entered Blairs College on the 24th August 1916, and the Seminary of St Sulpice, Paris, in 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Thomas A. Kelly.

The REV. THOMAS M'CANN was born at Denny on the 12th August 1898. He entered Blairs College on the 7th August 1913, St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in 1919, and the Scots College, Rome, in 1920. He received the tonsure on the 29th April, and minor orders on the 26th May and 28th October 1923, the subdiaconate on the 30th November 1924, and was ordained deacon on the 25th January 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by Archbishop Palica, in the Lateran Seminary, on the 10th May 1925.

The REV. GERALD S. M'DADE was born at Paisley on the 13th November 1899. He entered Blairs College on the

7th August 1913, and St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, on the 4th September 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Joseph Hamill.

The REV. JOSEPH M'ERLAIN was born at Brecart, Toomebridge, Co. Antrim, on the 29th May 1898. He entered St Malachy's College, Belfast, in 1914, and St Peter's College, Wexford, in 1920. He was ordained priest at Wexford by the Right Rev. William Codd, Bishop of Ferns, on the 13th June 1926.

The REV. THOMAS M'GARVEY was born at Uddingston on the 1st December 1896. He entered Blairs College on the 7th September 1913, St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in September 1919, the Scots' College, Rome, in October 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Thomas M'Cann.

The REV. DOMINIC M'GLYNN was born in Glasgow on the 22nd July 1901. He entered Blairs College in August 1914, and St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in September 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Joseph Hamill.

The REV. THOMAS P. M'GREGOR was born at Leith on the 27th April 1901. He entered Blairs College on the 24th August 1915, Scots' College, Valladolid, in 1920, and completed his course in St Kieran's College, Kilkenny. He received the tonsure on the 22nd June, and minor orders on the 23rd June 1924, the subdiaconate in June 1925, and was ordained deacon on the 8th September 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Downey, Coadjutor-Bishop of Ossory, in the Cathedral, Ossory, on the 30th May 1926.

The REV. JOHN M'NAIR was born in Glasgow on the 20th March 1901. He entered Blairs College in 1917, St Peter's, New Kilpatrick, in 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Joseph Hamill.

The REV. HECTOR M'NEIL was born at Perth on the 19th January 1901. He entered Blairs College in 1914, College of Propaganda, Rome, in 1920, and St Peter's, New Kil-

patrick, in 1924. He received the tonsure on the 31st March 1923, minor orders in October 1923 and November 1925, the subdiaconate on the 30th November 1925, and was ordained deacon on the 29th May 1926. He was raised to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Donald Mackintosh, Archbishop of Glasgow, in St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, on the 30th May 1926.

The REV. ALEXANDER M'WILLIAM was born at Buckie on the 28th May 1902. He entered Blairs College in August 1918, and the Scots' College, Rome, on the 24th October 1919. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Thomas Gannon.

The REV. JOHN BERNARD MALLOY was born in Dundee on the 15th August 1900. He entered Blairs College in August 1913, St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in September 1919, and the Scots' College, Rome, in October 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Thomas Gannon.

The REV. DANIEL O'BRIEN was born at Mossend on the 17th February 1901. He entered Blairs College on the 13th August 1918, and St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, on the 4th September 1920. The dates of his ordinations are the same as those of the Rev. Joseph Hamill.

The REV. CORNELIUS O'LEARY was born at Trippeenagh, Killarney, Co. Kerry, on the 1st July 1898. He was educated at St Brendan's, Killarney, St Kiran's, Kilkenny, and the *Almo Collegio Capranicense*, Rome. He received the tonsure in March and minor orders in September and December 1923, the subdiaconate on the 22nd May 1926, and was ordained deacon on the 23rd May 1926. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. James Downey, Coadjutor-Bishop of Ossory, in the Cathedral, Kilkenny, on the 30th May 1926.

The REV. MICHAEL ALOYSIUS PAYNE was born at Bowhill, Fife, on the 15th May 1903. He entered Blairs College on the 24th August 1916, the Seminary at Issy, France, in October 1921, and the Seminary of St Sulpice, Rue de Regard, Paris, in October 1925. He received the tonsure

on the 26th May 1923, minor orders on the 14th June and 18th December 1924, the subdiaconate on the 6th June 1925, and was ordained deacon on the 19th December 1925. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. John Toner, Bishop of Dunkeld, in St Andrew's Cathedral, Dundee, on the 29th May 1926.

5. OBITUARY.

Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. From henceforth now, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours; for their works follow them.—APOC. xiv. 13.

It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins.—2 MACHAB. xii. 46.

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. JAMES CANON BARRY, who died at Ballachulish on the 16th February 1926 in the 48th year of his age and the 25th of his priesthood.

The Very Rev. James Canon Barry was born at Cardiff on the 18th August 1877. At the age of ten he entered the Choir School, established at Oban by the late Marquess of Bute for the maintenance of the Cathedral services. Having there evinced an attraction for the clerical state he became in 1890 an alumnus of the Diocese of Argyll and the Isles, and entered Blairs College. In 1894 he was transferred to the Seminaire de Notre Dame des Champs in Paris, and the following year passed to the Sulpitian Seminary at Issy. He completed his course at the Seminaire de S. Sulpice, Paris, in 1901, and on his return to Scotland was ordained priest by the late Bishop Smith in St Andrew's Pro-Cathedral, Oban, on the 15th August 1901.

His first appointment was to Fort-William, where, as assistant to the late Mgr. Mackintosh, he at once endeared himself to the Catholics of Lochaber by his quiet, unassuming piety and untiring zeal. Two years later he was given charge of the lonely mission of Glencoe, and there his winning personality and un-failing cheerfulness soon secured the goodwill and esteem of the people amongst whom he lived. Five years later the development of Kinlochleven from a wild and rugged waste to a flourishing industrial centre made strenuous demands on his activities and self-sacrifice. The sudden inrush of some thousands of workmen threw a heavy burden on his shoulders, and the circumstances under which these men lived in the storm-swept, inaccessible hills, increased the hardships of his task. He surmounted these obstacles with determined zeal, and his assiduous ministrations won not only the affection of the men, but the public

recognition of the officials in charge of the scheme. The Church which he erected stands in Kinlochleven as a memorial to his indefatigable and courageous zeal. He also succeeded in building a new presbytery at St Mun's, in Glencoe.

In addition to his pastoral duties Canon Barry took an active part in all matters of common diocesan interest, and his services were highly valued by the ecclesiastical authorities. In 1924 he was nominated a member of the Diocesan Chapter. Several times he had been offered advancement in the diocese, but he was compelled to decline because of his enfeebled health. He had never been constitutionally robust, and the hardships of his earlier days in Glencoe had aggravated the chest trouble from which he suffered intermittently and which he endured in a most painful degree during the last fifteen years of his life. His unflinching cheerfulness and geniality concealed even to his intimate friends the reality of his condition, and his death came with startling suddenness on Tuesday the 16th February 1926.

The funeral took place at Oban on the following Friday. Solemn Requiem Mass, in presence of the Bishop of the Diocese, was celebrated by the Very Rev. William Canon Daly, V.G., Glasgow. The Right Rev. Donald Martin, Bishop of Argyll and the Isles, pronounced the Absolutions and officiated at the graveside. The panegyric was preached by the Right Rev. Mgr. Cameron, Rothesay. The Most Rev. Donald Mackintosh, Archbishop of Glasgow, was present at the ceremony, along with a large number of priests from all parts of Scotland.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. PETER HILGERS, who died at Barrhead on the 22nd May 1926 in the 61st year of his age and the 35th of his priesthood.

The Rev. Peter Hilgers was born at Geilenkirchen, in the Archdiocese of Cologne, on the 20th February 1866. He studied classics at Huenshoven and Paderborn, and from 1886 to 1888 followed the course of philosophy at St Trond, in Belgium. In January 1889 he entered the College of St Peter, New Kilpatrick, and there completed the usual course of studies in preparation for the priesthood. He was ordained priest by the late Archbishop Eyre on the Feast of Corpus Christi, 28th May 1891. His first appointment was to St John's, Glasgow, where he acted as assistant priest for a period of six years. In 1897 he was given charge of the mission of Gourrock, where he subsequently erected a presbytery, extended the school premises and improved the interior of the church. In 1901 he was transferred to Shotts. There his active zeal effected many improvements, and the church, schools and parochial halls of St Patrick's bear testimony to his successful endeavours. In 1912 he was transferred to Barrhead. In that populous centre his efforts continued to meet

with success, and the extension of the presbytery and the magnificent parish hall are a lasting monument to his capable administration.

The funeral took place at Barrhead on Tuesday the 25th May. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Very Rev. Emile Canon de Backer. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Most Rev. Archbishop Mackintosh. The panegyric was preached by the Rev. Aloysius Reifenrath, who also officiated at the graveside. The remains are interred in the cemetery adjoining the church at Barrhead.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. BERNARD LYNCH, who died at Maryhill, Glasgow, on the 3rd December 1925, in the 53rd year of his age and the 31st of his priesthood.

The Rev. Bernard Lynch was born at Glasgow on the 22nd December 1873. He was educated at St Aloysius' College, Glasgow, Mount St Mary's, Chesterfield and St Peter's Seminary, Partick. In 1895 he was ordained priest and appointed Chaplain to the late Archbishop Eyre, then resident at Bowmont Gardens, Hillhead. From 1899 to 1905 he served as assistant priest in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow. In 1905 he was given charge of the mission of Duntocher, whence in 1914 he was transferred to Saltcoats, in Ayrshire. In 1923 he was appointed to the Immaculate Conception, Maryhill, where his death occurred on the 3rd December 1925. The funeral took place on the following Saturday. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Right Rev. Mgr. H. Canon Forbes, D.D., and the Absolutions pronounced by the Most Rev. Donald Mackintosh, Archbishop of Glasgow. The prayers at the grave were read by the Right Rev. James W. M'Carthy, Bishop of Galloway. The panegyric was preached by the Rev. A. Mackintosh, Whiteinch, who paid an eloquent tribute to the deep spirituality, scholarly attainments and winning personality of the deceased, "a man of God at home in the world, but not of the world, whose refined character, gentle yet strong, affectionate yet masculine, dominating yet charitable, was a great natural gift, graced by a fine person and nourished by an ardent devotion to the two magnets of the human soul, the Blessed Sacrament and the Blessed Mother of God."

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. ANGUS CANON MACDONALD, who died at Whitebridge, Stratherrick, on the 19th February 1926 in the 67th year of his age and the 43rd of his priesthood.

The Very Rev. Angus Canon Macdonald was born at Fort William on the 9th April 1859. He entered Blairs College Aberdeen, on the 30th July 1872, and three years later passed

to St Edmond's College, Donay. In 1878, after a month spent in the Seminary at Issy in France, he was transferred to the Scots College, Rome. On the completion of the usual course of studies, he was raised to the priesthood by Mgr. Lenti on the 1st November 1883. On his return to Scotland in June 1884 he was stationed at Oban, and five years later was given charge of the Mission of Craigston, in Barra, where he continued to labour for the period of five years with characteristic energy and zeal. In 1893 he was transferred to Rothesay, and in this more populous district found ample scope for the display of his remarkable abilities in the administration of his parish and the organisation of its different activities. Two years later his services were given to the mission of Arisaig, but in 1903 he returned to Rothesay, where he continued to minister with conspicuous success for the next eighteen years. In 1919 he was made a canon of the Cathedral Chapter in recognition of his services to religion in the Diocese by Argyll and the Isles. After a short period in Glenfinnan he undertook the charge of St Mun's, Dunoon, in 1922, where he remained until failing health and the burden of years compelled him to relinquish active service. On his retiral in 1925 he went to reside at Whitebridge, in Stratherrick, and there his death occurred on the 19th February 1926.

The record of Canon Macdonald's career is that of a life spent in devoted service to his fellowmen. During more than forty-three years he laboured with indefatigable zeal in the faithful discharge of the manifold duties of a pastor of souls. He was highly esteemed by all with whom he came in contact, and loved by his clerical colleagues for his kindly disposition and genial, hospitable nature. He endeared himself to all in the district where his lot had been cast, and in his retirement at Whitebridge he received many a kind message of kindly remembrance and good wishes. His memory is fondly cherished throughout the Diocese of Argyll and the Isles.

The funeral took place at Stratherrick. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, Glasgow, who also preached the panegyric. At the service there were present the Right Rev. Donald Martin, Bishop of the Diocese, and a considerable number of the Clergy from different parts of the country. The music was rendered by a choir of Benedictine Monks from the Abbey of Fort Augustus. The remains were interred in the cemetery adjoining the Church at Stratherrick.

Pray for the soul of the Right Rev. Mgr. DONALD CANON MACDOUGALL, who died at Glenfinnan on the 6th October 1926 in the 84th year of his age and the 57th of his priesthood.

The Right Rev. Mgr. Donald Canon Macdougall was born at Craigston, Barra, on the 19th June 1843. At the age of fifteen he was admitted to Blairs College, Aberdeen, on the 16th August 1858. He was transferred to the English Benedictine College at Donay on the 27th April 1865, and on the 29th September of the same year passed to the Seminary at Issy. He completed his studies in the Seminaire de St Sulpice in Paris and was ordained deacon on the 18th December 1869. Shortly afterwards he returned to Scotland and was raised to the priesthood in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, by the late Archbishop Eyre, on the 15th January 1870. He entered upon duty on the 12th February following as assistant priest at Maryhill, Glasgow. On the 7th April of the same year he was sent to take charge of the mission of Bunroy, in Lochaber, where he succeeded the Rev. Donald Forbes and where he was destined to spend the long period of fifty-five years. On the erection of the Cathedral Chapter of the Diocese of Argyll and the Isles on the 20th August 1907 he was appointed Canon, and in 1920, on the occasion of the golden jubilee of his priesthood, he was made a Domestic Prelate of His Holiness the Pope in recognition of his life-long services to religion.

In the long missionary career of Mgr. Macdougall, there is little to chronicle that the secular historian would regard as of outstanding importance. The record of his career is the story of faithful devotion to the duties of his pastoral charge. He took an active interest in all that concerned the spiritual and temporal welfare of his parishioners. In their interest more than from any personal predilection he was induced to serve on the Education Authority, the Parish Council, and other local administrative boards. Among the people of Lochaber his memory will be cherished for generations as that of a saintly priest with a kindly heart and genial charitable nature. He was proud of the traditional fidelity of his flock to the faith of their fathers, and in turn they loved the pastor who in his demeanour and work portrayed to them the ideal of the Highland priest, the man of God and the servant of men. The sense of loss they experienced when in 1924 he was compelled through the weakness of years to retire from active service, was manifest in the expressions of their sorrow, and many a good wish for his happiness accompanied him in his retiral to lonely Glenfinnan. There the last year of his life was spent in quiet retiral, and his death occurred on the 6th October 1926.

The funeral took place the following Saturday. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Very Rev. John J. Canon Mackintosh, Roy Bridge. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Right Rev. Bishop Martin. The most Rev. Archbishop Mackintosh was present at the service accompanied by many of

the clerical friends of the deceased. The remains are interred in the ground on the Gospel side of the church at Glenfinnan.

Pray for the soul of the Right Rev.* Mgr. JOHN MACKAY, who died at Dunedin, New Zealand, on the 18th August 1926 in the 86th year of his age and the 58th of his priesthood.

The Right Rev. Mgr. John Mackay was born at Kirktown of Mortlach, Banffshire, on the 21st May 1841. He was educated for the priesthood at Blairs, Douay and St Sulpice, Paris, and was ordained priest in Paris on the 6th June 1868. After his ordination he was placed in charge of the mission of Banff, and during his incumbency the church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel was erected and opened for service in 1870. In 1871 Mgr. Mackay was compelled by ill health to seek a more congenial climate and emigrated to New Zealand, where he continued to render valuable service to the church in the Diocese of Dunedin for the long period of fifty-six years. May his soul rest in peace.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. CHARLES MURDOCH, who died at Aberdeen on the 1st September 1926 in the 57th year of his age and the 33rd of his priesthood.

The Rev. Charles Murdoch was born at Kintewline, Blairs, Kincardineshire, on the 22nd January, 1870. At the age of fourteen he entered Blairs College to pursue his studies for the priesthood. In 1888 he was transferred to the English Benedictine College at Douai, in France, and one year later was sent to the Scots College, Rome. He was raised to the priesthood in 1894, and on the completion of the usual course in the summer of 1895 returned to Scotland to enter on the career of a missionary priest in the Archdiocese of Edinburgh. His first appointment was to St Patrick's, Edinburgh. Three years later he was transferred to Stirling, where by his devotion to duty and sterling personal qualities he won the esteem of his ecclesiastical superiors and the affection of the people, among whom he laboured. In 1902 he was given charge of the mission of Loanhead, and in this more responsible position found ampler scope for the display of those qualities of organisation and administration which he possessed in a superior degree. In 1912 he removed to Bathgate, and during his incumbency of this populous parish his persevering energy and zeal effected steady progress and consolidation. In 1919 he was placed in charge of the mission of Falkirk, and in this busy industrial centre his tenure of office was marked with the same success that had characterised his earlier efforts. For some time his health had not been satisfactory, and feeling the need of an opportunity to recuperate his strength he had gone

to stay for a time with his relatives in Blairs. While there he was attacked with appendicitis. An operation was deemed necessary, but he was not destined to recover, and his death occurred on the 1st September 1926 in Kepplestone Nursing Home, Aberdeen.

The record of Fr. Murdoch's career is in a sense uneventful; it contains no deeds that the secular historian would regard as of outstanding importance, but the best testimony to its real value lies in the success of his parochial administration and the esteem and affection in which his memory is held by his colleagues and people. His days were spent in devotion to others, and his whole energy was given to the welfare of the flock committed to his charge. He was a model of quiet orderliness and methodical zeal, and his work was sensibly animated with that strong spirit of faith which he inherited from his Catholic ancestors, and which may be declared the dominant feature of his character. His death in the prime of manhood caused a deep sense of loss in the minds of his ecclesiastical superiors and colleagues, and a profound sorrow in the hearts of those to whom he had so faithfully ministered the sacraments and consolations of religion.

The funeral took place on Saturday the 4th September. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Francis Xavier's, Falkirk, by his nephew, the Rev. William Murdoch. The Absolutions were pronounced by the Right Rev. Bishop Graham, who also officiated at the graveside. The panegyric was preached by the Rev. John M'Kee, Camelon. The remains are interred in Mount Vernon Cemetery, Edinburgh.

Pray for the soul of the Very Rev. HUBERT CANON VAN STIPHOUT, who died at Airdrie on the 9th August 1926 in the 77th year of his age and the 53rd of his priesthood.

The Very Rev. Hubert Canon van Stiphout was born at Veghel, North Brabant, Holland, on the 1st December 1849. He entered the Gymnasium at Uden at the age of fourteen, but on expressing a desire to become a priest was transferred in 1864 to the Seminary of St Hertogenbosch at St Michael-Gestel. With the object of preparing for the Scottish mission he went in 1870 to the English College at Bruges. His studies were completed at the Grand Seminaire in that town. He received the tonsure on the 21st December 1872, minor orders on the 7th June 1873, the subdiaconate on the 20th December of the same year and was ordained deacon on the 30th May 1874. He was raised to the priesthood by the Right Rev. Mgr. Antonio, Coadjutor-Bishop to Cardinal Deschamps, on the 19th September 1874. He arrived in Scotland twelve days later, and on the 1st October was appointed assistant priest at St Patrick's, Coatbridge. Five years later he left Coatbridge to take charge of the mission of

Chapelhall, where during fourteen years he attended to the spiritual needs of this scattered parish and built the present church and presbytery. In November 1893 he was transferred to the more important centre of Airdrie, where he was destined to remain until the date of his death, the 9th August 1926. In January 1895 he was nominated Missionary Rector of St Margaret's, and in 1917 became a Canon of the Cathedral Chapter. The occasion of the golden jubilee of his priesthood, the 19th September 1924, was solemnly observed by the congregation of St Margaret's.

The half-century spent by Canon van Stiphout in the town and neighbourhood of Airdrie, was for the Catholic Church in the West of Scotland a period of remarkable growth; new parishes, new schools, new centres of Catholic activity were being established and Catholic power and influence were being gradually extended and consolidated. In this development the deceased took his full share of labour and toil. His whole energy was devoted to the welfare of his flock, and in the fulfilment of his duties he displayed an organising ability and business capacity that won him universal esteem, while his saintly demeanour and kindly hospitable nature secured the affection of his colleagues and an enduring memory in the hearts of his people. For some time the weight of years had compelled him to desist from tasks demanding physical strength, but to the very end of his life he was able to supervise the administration of his parish with his characteristic thoroughness and scrupulous exactitude. On the morning of the 9th August he received the last sacraments, and in the evening he was called to receive his reward.

The funeral took place on the following Thursday. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in St Margaret's, Airdrie, by the Rev. J. Geerty, Coatbridge. In the absence of the Most Rev. Archbishop Mackintosh, who was in Rome, the Right Rev. Mgr. Provost Ritchie, V.G., pronounced the Absolutions. The panegyric was preached by the Rev. J. Kelly, D.D., Greenock. The service at the graveside was conducted by the Rev. J. Geerty. The remains are interred in St Joseph's Cemetery, Rochsoles.

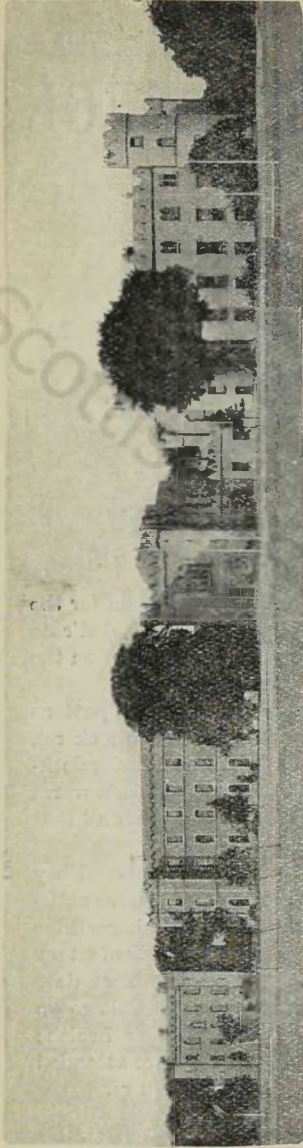
ALEXANDER KIDD

THE main object of this College is to educate and train for the Priesthood those who may feel themselves called to dedicate themselves to God and the salvation of souls as Clergymen on the Scottish Mission. To this object all its funds are applied.

The requisite outfit comprises two suits of tweed of the pattern known as parson grey (small boys may come in knickerbockers), two pairs of strong shoes, one pair slippers, the usual underclothing for day and night use, flannels, stockings and towels, a warm overcoat for winter. The Course of Education comprises all that is usually taught in Colleges.

Students will not be admitted before their twelfth year. They must bring with them a certificate showing that they have satisfactorily stood an examination in religious and secular knowledge equivalent to that required in the Highest Grade of an Elementary School. The time of entry is early in August—the exact date being fixed in June—and all students must be in the College on the day appointed. The greatest care is taken of their health; strict attention is paid to their comfort, and they are attended by a Medical Gentleman as often as occasion may require.
